A lot is happening around the ol' campsite these days. The investigation into the unfortunate vandalism and break-ins into boats on the water on May 3rd has centered on a suspect. The KDWP Law Enforcement officials need your personal reports of damage/loss ASAP so we can pursue legal action, and we intend to do just that. Several reminders have gone out with very little response – that bothers me. We have an opportunity to take some action and delayed reports (or lack of reports) will not help our case. We have had a few losses of boat motors in the Dry Storage in the last few weeks and reports need to be filed on that as well. At this point we do not know if the two incidents are connected. The investigations are ongoing and we need your help!

Your Security Committee is working on a plan to add/update our security system on the docks and in Dry Storage. Your Board hopes to take some action that will enhance our position in dealing with vandalism and break-ins, hopefully to prevent incidents rather than have to react to them. Your support in whatever action the Board takes will be much appreciated. We will provide more details to the membership as soon as plans are approved.

In that same light, I have been relying on our internet/email communication to rapidly provide information and, in turn, to receive feedback from our membership. However, our system is only as good as the information we have to work with. That means that you must provide us with a "correct" email address and telephone number so we can contact you in emergencies and when we have incidents that may need your immediate attention. I estimate that 75% of our membership has provided us with an email address, and we have been trying to keep those up-to-date. But we cannot notify you if you change your email address and then not tell us! Anytime your address, telephone number, email address, or other personal notification items change, please let your Club know immediately. I can't find a rule in our Handbook that "requires" you to keep us informed, but common sense and courtesy should play a role in doing this for the benefit of the individual member and the membership at large. If we don't have the correct information, our Calling Committee just might not invite you to our next party. Now that ought to make you think twice!

To keep your records up-to-date, please notify your Membership Chair, DeAun Warfield, of the above changes as soon as they happen so we can keep you informed. You may also contact our Treasurer, Ernie Condon, or me and we will pass the information on to Membership.

That's enough ranting and raving for one column. Let's enjoy our Club, the sailing, the lake, and the fellowship at WVSC and party on!

2009 SUMMER ADULT SAILING PROGRAM

The Walnut Valley Sailing Club/STEP program is offering two sessions this summer.

We will teach you how to sail in a Catalina 14.2 centerboard boat or improve your sailing ability in advanced classes. We also offer Basic Keelboat classes.

So come sail with us this summer for a GREAT time on the water.

Our adult fleet consists of — Catalina 14.2's, Sonar, Catalina 22 and Catalina 25's.

CLASS STRUCTURE

Age Prerequisites: Must be 18 years or older, have an interest in learning to sail and swim 25 yards without a lifejacket (PFD). (May be 15-17 years old if accompanied by an adult).

Equipment requirements: Participants are required to provide their own life jacket (PFD) US Coast Guard approved, age-appropriate size and sunscreen, hat and water shoes.

COURSE CONTENT:

Basic Sailing Course - Covers beginning, intermediate and advanced sailing techniques. Boat handling skills, boat related skills, basic rules of the road, safety, weather and nomenclature. Everything you need to know to sail your own boat safely and with confidence.

Basic Keelboat - The keelboat course leads you through the essential principles of safe, confident day sailing. It covers basic sailing concepts, boat handling, docking, anchoring, safety and emergencies, weather, basic navigation. The keelboat course requires a minimum of three students per boat.

Prerequisite for Basic Keelboat instruction - you must have the Basic Sailing Course or equivalent sailing experience.

Schedule: 3 days per week (Mon. Tues. Thurs.) for 3 weeks,

6 to 9pm.: July 6 through July 23 **Class Size:** 10 students per session

Cost per Student: WVSC members-\$25 non-refundable Registration Fee, Plus \$155 class fee, total cost-\$180; Non-members-\$25 non-refundable registration fee Plus \$155 for class fee and \$100 for ? annual WVSC club dues Total cost-\$280. (accompanying Spouse or family member \$180) **Fee Includes:** USSA "Start Sailing Right" or "Basic Keelboat" instruction manual, instruction, use of a Catalina 14.2 (if checked out) boat for the summer, T-shirt and certificate. Includes a membership to Walnut Valley Sailing Club, which begins at the beginning of class and continues for the remainder of the year.



June Meeting Minutes

WALNUT VALLEY SAILING CLUB BOARD OF GOVERNORS MEETING

Minutes Subject to Correction

THURSDAY, JUNE 25th, 2009

Call to Order: The regularly scheduled Board of Governors meeting of June 11 was postponed until June 25 due to a lack of a quorum. David Reynolds, Commodore, called the meeting to order at 7:01 pm. Debbie Chambers and Jerry Brady were not present. James Rix, Security Committee Chair was also present.

Approval of May Meeting Minutes: A motion to approve the minutes of the May meeting was made and approved.

Treasurer's Report: Ernie Condon reported that the CSSA dues have been paid. The ice service and concession license issues were researched and no issues were found. There was no further discussion and a motion to approve the report was made and approved.

Old Business:

Picnic Shelter concrete pad extension: This item was tabled from the May meeting. Discussion at this meeting was related to whether the picnic area need was greater for the concrete pad or shade for parties. It was decided that the need for shade was greater and that the concrete can be added later. Mike Wasson offered an awning plan that doubles the shaded area for a cost of ~\$4000. A motion was made to use 2009 Building and Grounds budget to fund an awning. Wasson will coordinate purchase of material and recruit Club labor.

Activities Center screen door replacement: The screen door has been replaced with the assistance of Clark Chambers and Gene Plehal.

Bagged ice for club use: A system is in place that utilizes a clubhouse freezer for selling ice but it was noted that a conflict occurs on party weekends when the party organizer needs priority to the freezer yet that is the time when many members are at the facility and may desire bagged ice. There was discussion of why the ice plan changed from last month. A motion was made to revert to the original plan that would have an ice freezer leased and located on the deck for members to purchase. The inside freezer would return to its previous use for members storage and party organizers. The motion passed on a vote of 5 approvals, 0 against and 2 abstaining.

Club House anchor repair: The anchor repair cost had been emailed to BOG members for approval but a quorum was not attained. A motion was made to approve the spending of 2009 Contingency budget funds for the repair of the anchor system for the estimated \$5233. The Commodore will contact Gene Nold to coordinate the work with Atlantic Meeco.

Vandalism investigation: The Park Police are preparing a report to be submitted to the Butler county attorney for considera-

tion of filing of charges for the May 3rd damage. Additionally, it has been reported that 4 outboard motors have been stolen from dry storage.

Security Committee report: James Rix passed out information concerning methods to improve security at the club house and the dry storage area. Most of the discussion involved unused capability of the current security system, limitations of an enhanced system and the costs involved. The Committee recommends increased utilization of the existing security system and no purchase of additional equipment. The Commodore requested that the Committee reach out to member experts for additional input and to report by next month.

New Business:

Fire extinguisher inspections: The Commodore has made an agreement with the extinguisher inspectors for scheduled inspections to be made at the facility each October.

New Awning: This was previously addressed in Old Business.

STEP program building location: It was noted that the STEP program building was regularly moved from north of the parking lot onto the parking lot due to high water. It was recommended that a crushed stone pad be made at the south side of the parking lot for the building during high water periods. The location would allow the full parking lot to be used by the members. Mike Wasson is to approach the STEP program with the idea.

Membership suspension: There was discussion about the suspension of a member family relating to the May 3rd vandalism. A motion was made to table any action on the suspension until after the Park Police report has been submitted and reviewed. Motion passed 6 to 1.

Boy Scout sail campout request from Blaine Van Dam: A request has been made to use the facility and boats for a
Scout sailing activity this fall. The STEP program has been
approached and had concerns regarding insurance. The request has
been tabled until STEP concerns have been addressed.

Member concerns: No concerns were reported.

Closing Remarks: The July meeting of the BOG will be Thursday, July 9, 2009, at the office of Steve Mardis, 9415 E. Harry, Suite 603. A motion to adjourn was made, seconded and approved. The meeting adjourned at 9:14 p.m.

Ambassadors of Good Will

My wife and I have owned a small, day sailer since 1976. It has been great fun for the whole family. I used to routinely launch it from the public ramp east of the WVSC's dock. About 25 years ago the club was no where near as big as it is now. There was no floating clubhouse and the dry storage area had just recently been built. Since we enjoyed sailing so much I talked it over with Cheryl and we decided to investigate what the club was all about. I was thinking that keeping our boat in the storage yard would be easier than hauling it back and forth from home every time we wanted to go sailing, plus it would free up some space in my garage. So one afternoon when we got off the water, Cheryl and I walked out onto the club's dock to find someone to speak to about the club. As we sauntered along we gawked at all the big sailboats and daydreamed about owning one. We hadn't gotten very far out onto the dock when a fellow on a boat a fair distance away spotted us, jumped off of his boat and at a dead run raced down to where we were at. As he slid to a stop in front of us, the conversation went like this:

HIM: "This is private property! What are you doing here?"

ME: "We're looking for someone to tell us about the sailing club."

HIM: "Do you have a sailboat?"

ME: "Do I have to have a sailboat to find out about the sailing club?"

HIM: "Well...no....but **do** you have a sailboat?"

ME: "You're not listening to me. I want to talk to someone about the sailing club, *other* than you!"

Eventually I got him to tell me that a couple of the club officers were working in the dry storage yard, so we walked up there to talk to them. These men were friendly and apologized for the other man's behavior. They told us what the club fees were and what services it had to offer. We thanked them for their time and left.

On our way home Cheryl and I discussed the club, but neither of us wanted to join. The encounter with that one fellow soured us on having anything to do with the WVSC. I've stored that boat in my garage ever since. It was just two years ago, when I finally bought one of those bigger boats, that joining the WVSC came back to mind. I soon got tired of having to step and un-step the mast every time we went sailing. I knew that keeping the boat in the storage yard with the mast up would save us almost 2 hours of work on every trip we made to the lake.

When I joined the WVSC I was pleased to find if full of friendly and interesting people. When I needed assistance with something, I found folks who would literally wade in to help me. As you all know, the WVSC is a good organization in which we can all take pride.

I mention all this because, with even a small slip of the tongue, what happened to me so long ago could happen again. A case in point occurred the day of this year's Shrimp Boil dinner. Cheryl and I invited another couple to go sailing with us that day, and then stay for the dinner that night as our guests. We were on our boat in the slip when we got a telephone call from our friends telling us they had just arrived at the club's parking lot. Before Cheryl could get over there to collect them, one of our members went up to them and, in a suspicious tone of voice, asked them why they were there. They told me later that they were rather put off to be challenged like that when all they did was just get out of their car and stand there looking around.

I think everyone has heard that old saying about never getting a second chance to make a good first impression. Whether we realize it or not, we are all ambassadors for the WVSC when we are out at the lake. A smile on the face, an outstretched hand and an offer to help a stranger, can truly work wonders. I might have been a club member for the last quarter of a century if that had been done to me all those years ago. Remember that there are no strangers, just potential new club members and friends.
