Yow. What a great month it has been. First, there was the annual Pig Roast, courtesy of John Balthrop and company, hosted by David and Christie Reynolds and supported by Marilyn and Dave Grisham. As always, a great meal that was topped off by an entertaining after dinner presentation by Bob Gress, Director of the Great Plains Nature Center, and accompanied by several truly fascinating wild animals. Truly a great job, all. Then, on August 22nd, some 16 sailboats departed the WVSC cove carrying 50, more or less, of John Carter's physician assistant students for what turned out to be an absolutely wonderful evening sail. As it turned out, I happened to be the fourth or fifth boat out of the cove. When I turned around to check the progress of the other boats, I saw a really magnificent sight. The entrance to the cove was filled with the sails of the other 12 boats gleaming in the faint sunlight of a partly cloudy western sky. After being rained out the day before and going through a day of uncertain weather, somehow we managed to pluck out a couple of hours of modestly descent wind. It was quite a show. I think our presence on the lake was noticed. I am quite sure that everyone, students, guests and skippers alike, had a good time. I would like to express my thanks to John Carter for providing the opportunity for WVSC to extend its hospitality to a great bunch of young adults. I would also like to thank the students for coming out to our facility and going sailing with us. I would sincerely hope that the opportunity to do this and events like this become a part of the WVSC tradition.

On a different note: The Park Service has approached WVSC for permission to use its facility for an event to be hosted by the Park Service on October 2nd. It is anticipated that there will be approximately 50 state and local officials will be in attendance. The purpose of the event is to showcase the lake, the facilities and activities present at El Dorado State Park. The Board unanimously approved the use of the facility by the Park Service for approximately a 3-hour period on that date. We should be flattered to have such a request in that it speaks very highly of the Club and its facility.

Now here's the catch. I would like to put our best foot forward for this event. Like they say, the first impression is the lasting impression. This should be our best impression. To that end, I have requested the appropriate Board liaisons and their respective committee chairs, to put together and publish a work party schedule at their earliest opportunity, to address a definitive list of things we can do to spruce up the facility between now and October 2nd. On the other hand, this is also a chance for you to contribute in the effort to promote your club's image in the eyes of the public, not to mention state and local officials. Opportunities like this do not come often so consider pitching in and making a difference.



Calm Wind Tests Centerboarders at Special Handicap Regatta

Ken Rix may be a sailing magician, but even he cannot call up winds on a calm Kansas day. Postponements, almost non-existent winds and steaming hot temperatures all conspired to derail the regatta, but a determined group of centerboard racers was not going to let anything get in the way of a race.

Shortly after lunch, Ken saw two leaves on the cottonwood tree by the clubhouse flutter at the same time, and he called out "Let's go racing!" Twelve boats launched and started out of the cove at a snail's pace, each crew assuring themselves that, surely, the wind would get better when the boats made it out into the main lake.

One by one, the boats got to the mouth of the cove and headed for the start line. The hoped-for-wind did not materialize but, surely, it would get better as the afternoon wore on. After all, didn't all the Wichita weathermen say the wind would build later in the day? Gene Plehal in a powerboat that was serving as a water stop decided to tow boats to the starting line to help get the race underway. It was a sight to see: 12 boats, all on starboard tack, clustered around the committee boat when the first horn went off. Five minutes later: 12 boats, all on starboard tack, just approaching the pin end of the line. Do you get the picture?

You've heard of sailboats "ghosting along", haven't you? What little wind there was turned fickle, shifting willy-nilly and creating holes in different parts of the course. It was so still in the holes that the only sound you could hear was the sweat rolling off skippers and crew. There was lots of surreptitious sculling of tillers to complete tacks before all momentum was lost, but we won't name names here. Some skippers called for Gene Plehal to bring a bottle of water, hoping that the powerboat's wake would somehow propel them out of a hole into a spot of breeze.

Little Emily Rix and her crew James (Snipe) were first to the windward mark, followed by Pat Boyarski and Clark Chambers (Fusion 15), just ahead of Mary Ann Rix and Liesl Nauck (Snipe). The race committee, taking pity on the racers, decided to shorten the triangle course by eliminating the leeward mark and instructed the racers to head back to the line after rounding the reach mark.

The first 3 boats rounded the reach mark in the same order, but then things got interesting. Emily and James went downwind instead of sailing directly toward the finish in an attempt to build boat speed. Mary Ann and Liesl caught Pat and Clark shortly after the mark and assumed a

position just ahead and to windward. Just before it was too late, Emily turned to her Dad and said, "I don't care about your tactics, I'm heading for the finish line." At almost the same time, Clark convinced his reluctant skipper that their only chance was to duck Mary Ann's Snipe, get clean air and try to get overlap before getting to within two boat lengths of the pin.

One hour and fifty-two minutes after starting, Emily and James crossed the line. Pat and Clark did get overlap, forcing Mary Ann and Liesl to fall off, so the Fusion crossed second, followed a few seconds later by the Snipe. Crossing fourth were Kyle and Jerry Brady in their Flying Scot, followed by Sharon and Terry Lewis (Snipe), Doug Johnson (Sunfish) and Grey Rowell with crew Matt Chesebrough (Catalina 14.2). The remaining boats did not finish.

Wouldn't you know it? The wind finally did pick up a bit as the exhausted crews made their way back to the cove. It was the best sailing of the day.

At the clubhouse, Ken Rix applied the Portsmouth handicap as well as his own additional handicap based on boat ownership, age, gender and race experience. The final results are reflected below. A table full of sailing accessories provided gifts for the skippers and crews, followed by a meal of hot dogs, potato salad and beans expertly prepared by Mike Hand. Despite the conditions, the day provided a real lesson in light wind sailing.



Board Meeting Minutes

WALNUT VALLEY SAILING CLUB BOARD OF GOVERNOR MEETING
MINUTES SUBJECT TO CORRECTION

THURSDAY, AUGUST 11, 2005

CALL TO ORDER: Commodore
Clark Chambers called the meeting to
order at 7pm in the office of Marilyn
Chambers. Board members present were

Clark Chambers, Ron White, DeAun Warfield Gene Plehal, Marilyn Kroupa, Pat Boyarski, John McCabe, James Rix and Mac Carter. Guests were Arnie Kroupa and Daniel Rix.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: The minutes of the July 14, 2005 meeting were reviewed for approval. Boyarski made a motion to approve that was seconded by Kroupa. Motion carried.

APPROVAL OF THE TREASURERS

REPORT: Treasurer Kroupa reviewed the June and July 2005 financial report. There was a discussion regarding the cost of cleaning the Activity Center. That review will be conducted at a later date. Rix made a motion to approve the report that was seconded by Carter.

Kroupa presented Delton and Lyn Sandefer as new members. He is employed by USD 249 and they have three children. Their boat is a McGregor 26 with the name "Nuthin' Fancy and is located in Dock A. White made a motion to approve their membership application that was seconded by Plehal. Motion Carried. Welcome Delton and Lyn.

OLD BUSINESS: Commodore Chambers asked for work party projects. Arnie Kroupa reported the replacement of the roof overhang material on the shelter will be started by the "Wednesday morning crew" and completed on August 27, 2005. The approximate cost of the materials will be approximately \$80.00.

Commodore Chambers announced that the Park Department has requested the use of our Activity Center on October 2, 2005 for the purpose of demonstrating to our State Senators and others interested in the Park System the value of the parks. They will be reconsidering the approval of SB87 (lake fees vs. auto tag fees for park usage) again this year.

The WSVC Board has been invited to attend this event as well as other interested members. He asked for a special work party in September to assure our facility is in top condition for this event. A motion to approve this request was made by McCabe and seconded by Warfield. Motion carried.

Ron White reported that the Long Range Planning Committee has been formed and will be meeting during the week of August 15, 2005. He will report their progress at the next Board meeting.

Commodore Chambers noted that changes or corrections to the Membership Handbook need to be sent to Kimberly Rix by email prior to August 31, 2005.

Commodore Chambers asked that Committee Chair progress reports be submitted to The Windward for printing in the September issue.

Pat Boyarski reported that he will update and present a financial status report before the 2006 budget is presented at the Annual Meeting.

NEW BUSINESS: Commodore Rix noted that preparation of the agenda for the Annual Meeting in November needs to begin in September. The board also needs to select a nominating committee for the replacement of members going off the board this year.

Ron White presented a recap of the Junior Regatta. All who participated had a great time and the Regatta was a success. He suggested a review of the agenda to assure continued participation. A special thanks to Jim Siebert for the photography and CDs that were given to the participants.

MEMBER CONCERNS: The board considered a request from John Carter to install steps on the finger of his dock to assist in boarding his boat. The handbook in Section B, Paragraph 4 restricts this usage. It was determined the usage of the steps are acceptable as long as they are not permanently attached to the dock.

NEXT BOARD MEETING: Commodore Chambers set the next meeting on September 15, 2005 at the office of Marilyn Kroupa beginning at 7pm.

There being no further business, Carter made a motion to adjourn that was seconded by Plehal. Motion carried.

Tips from the Rear: DEPOWERING

When the wind increases, do you find yourself healing more than 20 degrees? Or do you have to pull hard on the tiller to keep the boat going straight? Or you're hiked out all the way and can't keep the (centerboard) boat flat? These are all signs that your sail plan is generating more power than the optimum wind speed your boat is designed for. Even though your sails are producing more power, it doesn't mean that you are going any faster. In fact, these are all signs that you are actually sailing slower!

Rule 1 - Don't feather the jib by pinching into the wind. This is a natural tendency to reduce heel. Pinching will cause a big loss of Velocity Made Good (VMG) due to loss of driving force with an increase in side slip. Dropping boat-speed will increase the healing moment to make you want to pinch into the wind even further. Have you ever noticed how much more your boat will heel if you sheet the sails in from a standstill? Keep the boat driving by depowering your sails.

Here are some things you can do to depower which will help you reduce heal, sail easier, and go faster (if you're racing).

- Tighten the Outhaul This flattens the sails thus reducing the camber (depth of the chord) and takes power out of the main.
- Move the Jib Fairleads aft This reduces healing by opening up the top of the jib but keeps the bottom in for pointing ability.
- Tighten the Cunningham This flattens the sail more and moves the center of the chord forward to keep driving ability.

- Let out the Traveler The easiest way to reduce weather helm and still keep the jib driving is to let out the traveler. This allows the main sheet to remain tight, which in turn keeps the main flat. A secondary effect is that it also keeps the jib forestay in tension, keeping the jib flatter as well. In high wind, I work the traveler in the puffs and not the main sheet. As the wind continues to increase, continue to let the traveler out until the jib effectively becomes the only driving sail. Remember, avoid pinching into the wind.
- Bend the mast as prescribed in the March edition of 'Tips from the Rear'. On the snipe we do this with the jib halyard for bending higher up the mast and the boom vang for low bending.
- As last resort, rapidly dump the main in gusts. If you only slightly ease the main, you are actually increasing the power of both sails which is the opposite of what you want. If you get hit with a 30 knot + blast, you want to quickly dump the pressure on the main to keep the boat flat, then immediately sheet it back in.
- For cruisers Reef the Main and reduce (furl) the Jib; reduce the sails in a balanced manner. Reducing the jib too much without reefing the main will cause excessive weather helm. Reefing the main without reducing the jib could cause a lee helm which is dangerous in high wind. Each boat is different, so talk with someone who has experience with your boat class to find out the best sail reduction plan.


