# **January Meeting Minutes**

#### WALNUT VALLEY SAILING CLUB BOARD OF GOVERNORS MEETING

Minutes Subject to Correction

#### THURSDAY, JANUARY 14TH, 2010

**Called to order Attendees: Board members:** D.

Reynolds, R. Brown, P. McCausland, J. McCabe, G. Mackey, D. Johnson, G. Rincker, C. Chambers

Guests: Gene Plehal, Mike Hand, John Carter, Clark Chambers

Minutes from December board meeting: Accepted.

#### **Treasurer's report:**

Numerous members have expressed concerns about the Club's declining membership. At this time, nine members have not paid. One previous member has a boat in dry storage that is in extremely poor condition. Another has a boat in a slip and has not paid all of last year's fees (has made partial payment of last year's fees).

Discussion of need for firmer action on the "abandoned" boat in dry storage (extension of time has been more than generous; we need to terminate the leniency). Gene Nold recommends that we take the same action as we did with previously abandoned boats.

Ernie Condon took the action to call and warn of possible legal action, and ask if boat can be hauled away – need permission/answer in writing.

The other member that has not paid and has property in the slips needs to be notified of no further leniency (Condon action), and to inquire as to his plan of action.

Treasurer is to send out letters of termination for all members that have not paid dues. Paul McCausland offered to review any letter that is generated.

The Treasurer discussed concerns about the Christmas party being a net loss. It was noted that it was known prior to the party and discussed with 2009 Commodore, 2010 Commodore, and 2009 Treasurer. The Social Committee met budget for the year, which is the intent.

Treasurer's standard monthly report was reviewed and approved.

#### **Member Concerns:**

Last month we received the resignation of Mike Wasson as a Board of Governors member. Efforts were made to find a replacement. The member chosen from that effort is Paul McCausland. Motion to accept Paul was approved. Paul will get with Bruce Ward to provide a picture for the website.

#### New Location of STEP "container":

Handout provided with description of needs, as well as five investigated options. The low end of options included basically moving and painting the existing pod. The upper end is effectively a 2-car garage.

There was a discussion that reviewed the club's financial abilities and concerns of members who have not paid causing a tightening

of the budgets. STEP has no available funds to assist – Commodore would like to understand the details of this more.

STEP recommendation (presented by David Reynolds) was based on the

current concerns about the club and STEP finances. The recommendation was to proceed with the original minimal plan on a trial basis, and if the appearance continues to be an issue then move the building back to the current location in dry storage. (It was noted that many members have expressed concern over the appearance of this option).

Concerns from Mike Hand: We have spent much more than \$40,000 on the STEP program.

STEP has many more boats than it has instructors. The subcommittee meeting to discuss this subject did not include the agreed to interested parties.

Gene Plehal: Money spent on shelter expansion would be of benefit to more members.

Aesthetics is still an issue.

Reduced distance is not as much as discussed. Adding a gate on north side of dry storage would be a help.

Money would be spent better elsewhere.

John Carter: Agrees with Gene's points.
Also recommends maintaining status quo (not move the container).

Clark Chambers: Principle objection of the move was aesthetics. None of the viable options presented seem to address this issue. Pre-fab buildings have not been investigated thoroughly, and seem to be a cheaper approach than some presented. The minimal option does not address anything adequately. Because of the financial concerns, it is suggested that we take our time and make this a longer term effort, and give it due course of action.

Paul McCausland: Also recommends "tabling" this so that he has time to get with the chair of Building and Grounds and other interested parties. The attempt that was held was not a quorum and a false start.

Rob Brown: Do not overturn the existing approval to move the container just yet. Other discussion about tabling the taking of action (i.e. – no moving of the container) until a better resolution is achieved.

Today's conclusion: Continue with further effort to address this properly with the right number of people. The committee will include a representative chosen by the concerned parties.





The Racing Activities Committee this year consists of Dan Barlett, Chairman and assisted by Ken Rix, Ted Blankenship, Gary Mackey, Gene Nold and David Leiker. We have been putting together a full calendar of club races and regattas for the summer of 2010. Feel free to contact any of the members with suggestions or comments.

There will be a meeting for all interested in participating or just curious on **February 14th** at **2:00 p.m.** at **Gander Mountain** in the Gander Lodge. We will discuss the racing

schedule, point system, race committee duty and whatever else needs to be discussed.

We have also set up two training sessions. The first one will be held at Gander Mountain in the Gander Lodge on March 28 beginning at 2:00 p.m., and the second training session will be an on the water session at the lake on May 1 with an alternate date of May 15.

We are looking forward to another fun-filled summer of racing, so come on out and join us.

<u>Picnic Shelter Expansion Plans:</u> Original plans would have resulted in a structure that would have appeared different than existing section and also may have appeared temporary. Desire (and approval) is to proceed with a structure that looks more like existing section. However, this is on hold pending more closure on our revenue flow this fiscal year.

A recommendation was made by the past Treasurer to gear up the Finance committee to compare membership levels and budgets from prior years in case we need to re-budget. If WVSC survived with fewer members in the past, we may need to know how.

### **Ted Wells**

1907-1991

There was no early hint that Ted Wells would become a champion sailor. His interest as a youngster was in flying. Born in Corning, Iowa, in 1907, his parents moved to Omaha, Nebraska, before he was a year old. He built an airplane in his parent's garage when he was 15 years old. He graduated from Princeton in 1929 with a degree in Engineering and was pleased to say he helped the professors write the requirements for his aeronautical courses.

While a student at Princeton, he purchased an old Jenny, offered the plane for flying lessons to finance his flying lessons. Ted later barnstormed county fairs in Kansas and Nebraska.

In 1930 Ted married an Omaha beauty, Margery Adair. Marge was a warm, considerate lady. In addition to crewing for Ted on the Snipe, she and Ted had many lovely parties in their home for a wide circle of friends. When Marge quit as a crew, she continued to accompany Ted to regattas and usually spent her time on shore visiting friends and doing needlework. Marge and Ted were both only children and had no children of their own, but doted on a succession of cairn terriers.

After college, Ted went to work for Travel Air and began racing airplanes. Five months later he won the \$10,000 first prize in the cross-country derby of the National Air Races. He also became a member of the caterpillar club when he parachuted out of a plane before it crashed. He and Walter Beech resigned from Travel Air in 1932 and formed Beech Aircraft Company; Ted became chief engineer and vice president.

In 1938, Ted decided to race sailboats rather than airplanes and joined the Wichita Sailing Club. The club sailed on Santa Fe Lake, which was an overgrown mud puddle of about 200 acres. He perfected his skills and went on to win many trophies, including firsts in the SCIRA (Snipe Class International Racing Association) US Nationals in 1947, 1949, 1952, the Western Hemispheres in

1952 and the World Championship in 1947 and 1949.

In 1953, the Nationals were sailed on Lake Murray at Ardmore, Oklahoma. Ted was there to sail, but Beech Aircraft phoned and sent a plane to pick him up. He arrived at the plant in Wichita, went into a meeting and a short while later reboarded the plane, flew back to Ardmore and resumed sailing. He was no longer an employee of Beech Aircraft — it interfered with his sailing. He won third place that year.

Ted soon started a consulting business and later became a banker. He wrote several books, including *Scientific Sailboat Racing*, which was published in several languages and *Wells Wanderings*, which became a regular article in *Snipe Bulletin*. He was SCIRA commodore in 1954 and rules committee chairman for many years.

Ken and I competed with Ted in many races and I crewed for him occasionally. I never saw him angry or behave in an unsportsmanlike way, although he had no tolerance for foolish questions and declined to give information that any sailor should know or could find in the rulebook.

In 1983 the Masters were held in Omaha and many past SCIRA commodores were

there: Eddie Williams, Fred Schenck, Floyd Hughes, Paul Festerson and Ted Wells. I went with Marge and Ted to help with the driving and crew for Ted. We had a grand time and before a dinner party at the Festerson's, drove past Ted's High School and family home and the hotel where Marge's mother lived for many years. It reminded me of the first regatta I attended in Omaha when Ken and I were on our honeymoon. That was in 1954 and I enjoyed meeting and visiting with Ted and Marge's parents.

Among honors Ted received during his lifetime were:

- 1947-- Commendation from the Board of Commissioners of Wichita for winning the international Snipe championships at Lake Geneva, Switzerland, and the US championship regatta at Marblehead, MA.
- Presentation from YMCA for dedicated service to the Wichita YMCA board of directors, 1962-1989.
- 1991 Kansas Aviation Hall of Fame Membership award from Walnut Valley Sailing Club, formerly named Wichita Sailing Club.
