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From the Bow Pulpit - Again

n our July Windword, Fred Harvey wrote an article entitled "Ambassadors of Good Will", giving his impressions of, and experience at, WVSC some years ago and very recently. I was pleased that he wrote the article, but disturbed that it contained the reality of what some of our visitors/guests have experienced, and do experience, to this day. This, unfortunately, is not the first time I have heard a similar story. Fred pointed out that our "first impression" may be our "only impression" when a visitor comes to our Club to look around and seek information about our activities. Generally, our greeting to a visitor should be something on the order of "Welcome to Walnut Valley Sailing Club. How can we help you?" I will admit there are times when a visitor should be challenged upon entrance, but only in certain circumstances. And it can be done without making a bad impression on the visitor. Let's all remember to follow Fred's advice and be Ambassadors for WVSC and encourage visitors and inquirers to see our facilities in a positive light, both at the lake and elsewhere. Our future is in our membership and its participation in our sailing and social activities.

I also had the opportunity to visit with the guy who cleans our Activities Center every week. That's an interesting job – cleaning toilets and sinks, mopping the floor, and emptying trash. We have made a fairly good impression on him, so he reports. He was amazed at how relatively clean we keep the building – even the bathrooms are in pretty decent shape when he arrives – with the volume of activity we seem to experience during the week, and, of course, the weekends. And he was impressed with the way we try to re-cycle cans, bottles and plastic. He says he hauls a nice load to the El Dorado Re-Cycle Center every week. There are a few food scraps left on the floor or tables from time to time, but usually the bigger spills are cleaned up. One thing he did mention was that he finds trash – paper and other stuff – in the aluminum can recycle bin in the Club House, and bags of mixed trash, with recycle items, in the bins at the picnic shelter. They are easily separated, but usually messy, and it takes extra time for him to sort out the trash from the recycle items. All in all, we seem to be doing a good job of keeping our Activities Center clean and ready for our members to enjoy. If you think of anything we can do to improve our care and cleaning of the building, please let me know and I will pass it on.

Your Board and Committee Chairs continue to work on maintaining and improving our facilities for the enjoyment of our membership. We are facing some serious long-term maintenance issues that need to be addressed as

we move along and our buildings, fences, docks, and equipment age. We hope we can count on your support to volunteer when needed to maintain and improve our Club.

We look forward to seeing you at the Lake and at our August social.

Other Stuff

As of this writing (July 20) (approximately ½ the season), we have had 12 keelboat races, & 6 centerboard races. This compares with last season's 13 keel & 11 centerboard races for the entire year. We have also had 14 different keelboat skippers participating this year vs. 11 last year, & 5 centerboard skippers vs. 10 last year. Obviously, something is improving for keel boats & un-improving for centerboards.

I don't understand why people prefer the bigger boats other than – they don't tip over, they don't require as much work to sail, they have space for a beer cooler, they can be raced in higher winds, & they are high enough off the water to not get spray all over you. With c'board boats, it's a contact sport – contact with the elements, other boats, & aggressive behavior.

More Other Stuff

Mike Hand (& lots of others including myself) want to have a "Long Distance" race Sept 12, when he is scheduled to be Race Committee. It would be difficult to rationally handicap because Portsmouth numbers are based on predominately Olympic courses with lots of close hauled time, so this day's race will not count toward the seasons standings. It should be a fun race for die-hard racers, & die-hard non-racers. More on this race next month.

Extra Stuff

I got a request for information on "heaving to". I'm not sure of the terminology, but if you want to relax between races you might try this technique which works for centerboard boats. Let the main sheet all the way out, slow down, & put the jib on the windward side (back winded), cleat it there, & slowly push the tiller to leeward. The boat becomes stable, stays on a relatively constant heading, & slowly drifts forward. One word of caution — don't stretch the leech (back edge) of the jib cloth by pulling the jib sheet too tight, or over the mast spreaders. P.S. Don't get too relaxed or you could run into an iceberg.



The following article describes the current zebra mussel situation in our area:

That zebra mussels are difficult to find at El Dorado Lake this summer doesn't mean blue catfish have eaten them all or that they're no longer a concern to biologists.

"Right now we're having our first population cycle at El Dorado," said Jason Goeckler, Wildilfe and Parks aquatic nuisance species specialist. "They're still there. Populations will be coming back. We need to remain vigilant."

Goeckler said populations of adult mussels and their larvae are down to levels found shortly after zebra mussels were discovered in 2003.

He said northern lakes that have had zebra mussels for more years have experienced cyclic swings in populations. Numbers can again rise from very low to high within a few years.

Being one of the most southern lakes in America's zebra mussel range could hamper the come back. Still, lake users should follow mandated procedures to keep from spreading mussels from El Dorado to other waters.

Currently, Cheney and Perry Lakes have the highest zebra mussel populations in Kansas. They were discovered in both lakes in 2007.

Zebra mussels were found in Marion Lake and Lake Afton last year, but remain in low densities. Goeckler stressed measures to prevent their spread should be followed.

July Meeting Minutes

WALNUT VALLEY SAILING CLUB BOARD OF GOVERNORS MEETING

Minutes Subject to Correction

THURSDAY, JULY 9TH, 2009

Call to Order: Commodore David Reynolds called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. All members except Ken Rix were present.

Approval of June Meeting Minutes:

A motion to approve the minutes of the June meeting was made and approved.

Treasurer's Report: Ernie Condon presented one new membership application – Tony Hoss - for the Board to vote on. Hoss is a 2008 STEP graduate. A motion to approve the application was made, seconded and approved by unanimous vote. The Treasurer is completing the credit application for the commercial ice supply vendor, Arctic Ice, and will forward to the supplier. He also reported that the Shrimp Boil and the Jamaica Vacation parties were a net loss to the Club and some discussion was had over more careful planning of food costs and entertainment to remain in budget or consider an increase in meal prices. A motion to approve the report was made and approved.

Old Business: Mike Wasson gave an update to the board on progress being made to extend the roof of the shelter house. Mike contacted Butler Rural Electric and they will drill the holes for the roof supports for free as a service to the community. The company cannot give us a date the holes will be drilled as they will schedule the work when they are slow with their regular duties. Mike is hoping the roof can be completed by the end of the sailing season.

Commodore Reynolds and the Board reviewed the situation with having ice available for members to purchase. The Board decided to use the commercial vendor, Arctic Ice, at the June Board meeting and we will continue to use the ice provided by the Friends of El Dorado Lake until the commercial vendor is set up. We are waiting on the processing of the credit application and the delivery of equipment.

Commodore Reynolds reported that the sales agreement has been signed and faxed to Atlantic Meeco to start the work. A check for ½ the contract amount will be provided by the Treasurer tonight and mailed tomorrow per the contract requirements. Work is expected to start in about 4 weeks.

Commodore Reynolds reported that the investigative report has been filed with the Butler County Attorney and is awaiting review for possible legal action. The Commodore will notify the Board of any further action.

Commodore Reynolds reported he had discussed the moving of the STEP sail loft/equipment building to the grass south of the parking lot (the plan suggested by Mike Wasson at the June Board meeting). STEP suggested that we wait until we can provide a concrete pad before we move the building off the parking lot. Moving the building will open up only 2 to 3 parking places and access still needs to be open on the parking lot for use of the building.

Commodore Reynolds reported that he has not received any addition information regarding the Boy Scout Sailing and Campout event. This will remain on hold until additional info is received.

New Business: Greg Rincker, Vice Commodore, presented a list of things that the Long Range Planning committee feels are items that need to be addressed and acted on. The first item on their list, and the one they feel needs to be addressed first, is expanding and reconfiguring the Dry Storage area. Greg stated that the list of additional items that had been identified by the committee would be available for the board to discuss at a future time. Discussion on plans to expand dry storage was tabled for the moment.

John Ellison reported that he had been working on weed removal in the Dry Storage area. There continues to be a problem with tumbleweeds accumulating near the north fence. John stated that Wayne Hemmen will be working on getting rid of the tumble weeds and also doing some spraying while John is in Houston the next few days. They are also looking into repairing the fence.

Commodore Reynolds announced that Gene Plehal will be hosting another swap meet this coming Saturday, July 11th, from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. It is announced in the WVSC July newsletter and in the Ninnescah Sailing Association newsletter.

Member Concerns: John Carter reported that a member had brought to his attention that the boards supporting the pump in the sewer waste pump out station are sagging and appear to need replacement. The concern is that it is the main support for the holding tank and pump, and is critical to the sewage disposal system. The chair of the Activity Center will be contacted with this concern.

Closing Remarks: The August Board meeting will be August 13th at 7:00 PM at the offices of Steve Mardis.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 PM.


