

Jake Riley, KDWP, El Dorado State Lake - Park Manager

A few days ago I had the opportunity to ride around the lake with Jake and ask him a few casual questions about his new position as the Park Manager at El Dorado State Lake. Right off the bat it's quite apparent that Jake is very organized, extremely polite, totally professional and... above all else, a really nice guy that loves everything about the great outdoors. What follows is a synopsis of our conversation. I promised Jake no more than a dozen questions. Staying true to form, I only asked him twelve. In no particular order, here they are with Jakes replies:


What's the strangest thing you've ever come across as Park Manager?

During a red flag - burn ban warning - park rangers answered the call to an out of control fire in the park. When they arrived at the scene they found a group of men dressed in full witches and warlock regalia, complete with double edge swords and a flaming altar - the source of the out of control fire. All of this happened on the night of the parks Trunk or Treat Halloween night.

What do you like to do when you're not at the lake?

Reading, travel, sports of all kinds, football, basketball, baseball. Jake also mentioned travels to South America, and Munich Germany. One of his favorite trips was to Belize where he participated in a research program in the jungle.

If you had the mic and twenty minutes to talk to an auditorium full of elementary kids, what would you discuss as a park manager?



What's the one thing you wish every visitor to El Dorado State Park knew?

Jake was a bit hesitant to say so, but he wishes visitors would respect the "dogs on a leash" regulation. Dogs are always to be on a leash and no further than ten feet from their owner. The park has a no-leash area, but Jake doesn't feel like it's well suited to dogs being off leash. Plans are in the works to build an enclosed area for dogs to work with their owners and play. There will be teeter totters, tunnels, etc.

As the new Park Manager at El Dorado, what improvements or changes do you invision for the next three to five years?

Developing five miles of BMX trails, using GPS to replot existing trails and rebuild what is already mapped. Adding educational areas with bee hives, plantings for native pollinators,

Less tech time, the importance of public land and public land management. Respect for local flora and fauna. The importance of getting outside and being active which aids in both physical and mental health. Jake emphasized the fact that he would like them to understand that:

"The planet is good without us, but we are not good without it."

What is your favorite time of year at the lake?

Autumn, Jake likes the change of seasons and especially the cooler weather. Things quiet down and there's more time to spend around a good campfire.

Who maintains the buoys and will the ones we're missing be replaced and/or repositioned any time soon?

To my surprise Jake informed me that the Game Warden is responsible for the "no wake buoys" etc. and that he helps them reset them once per year. He's aware that many of them have drifted to shore. We drove down to check the water depths at one of the public docks and noticed one on its side in the weeds on shore...

Jakes' favorite bird:

The secretary bird or secretarybird (Sagittarius serpentarius) is a large, mostly terrestrial bird of prey. Endemic to Africa, it is usually found in the open grasslands and savanna of the sub-Saharan region. Common to the coasts of Sudan and South Africa. The secretary bird is instantly recognizable as a very large bird with an eagle-like body on crane-like legs that give the bird a height of as much as 1.3 m (4 feet 3 in).

wildflowers, forbs, native plants, removal of invasive species (red cedar, lespedeza, Callery pear, etc.). Increase acreage of controlled burning and encourage hay lessees to help maintain the native prairie we have. In addition, Jake plans to host a monthly "women's day in the park," an astronomer's night, pheasant forever activities and many other educational events. Jake wants to improve what we have and focus less on new construction.

I asked "Doug and Tosha" at the front desk if they had a question for their new boss. They smiled, then told me to ask Jake when all of the trees will be removed from the lake... seems to be a common question at our local park office. Curious to the hear the answer, I asked. Jake chuckled and quickly replied, "Never."

Finally, have you ever been at the helm of a sailboat Jake?

"Nope, but I sure would like to."

We're going to make that happen next summer at WVSC!

JUST BEYOND B DOCKS

- The winter of 1984 saw the lake freeze over in the cove to 11" in depth. Bob said this would be the perfect time to pour the launch ramp...
- Bob instructed the concrete truck driver to back out on the ice to pour concrete in the forms which were 70' long.

Can you believe it? They're both true statements and part of our amazing club history. The following article was submitted by Gary Pierce who actually was there "In the Beginning."

IN THE BEGINNING

A study and discussions about possibly moving the Wichita Sailing Club to El Dorado Lake began in 1981. Paul Burris was Commodore and he suggested the Board begin studying the

possibility of moving. Gary Pierce and Bob Peugh volunteered to do a study on the location of the club.

The first choice for location was to move to the cove that was located west of the Shady Creek Marina. The marina was the only one at that time that had water, sewer and electricity. There was also an abandoned black top road that ran directly to this cove.

The State Project manager was strongly against this location fearing that located so close to the marina would be a competition and deterrent to the development and operation of the marina. The State Project Manager became a very real adversary to the location of the club any where of the lake. After much debate with the State authorities, the present location was chosen with agreement to have water and electrical lines installed up to the cove where the club is now located. Bob Peugh led the survey crew which consisted of himself, Ken Six and Gary Pierce. A detailed plan was developed and a Master plan was presented to the Club Board In 1982 Mary Ann Rix became Commodore and that is when the decision was definitely made to make the move and change the name of the club to better reflect the location of the club. In 1982 the first draft of a concessionaire's license was developed with the State Parks department.

This choice of location was not in favor with the marina or the state officials. The marina operator did not want the club on the lake at all (competition) and the State Park Department was the lease holder of the marina and did not want the marina to fail because of business going to WVSC.

There were many meetings with the State Representatives from the lake district. Political pressure finally had the State Park officials give us a choice of another location: the cove we now occupy. One major requirement was written into the concessionaire license; there would be no power boats allowed in the club facility, only sailboats.

In 1983 Tom Schroder became Commodore and signed the first Concessionaire license dated September 9, 1983. The club name was officially changed December 19, 1983 from the Wichita Sailing Club to the Walnut Valley Sailing Club.

In 1984 Bob Peugh became Commodore. He was in charge of the property survey that determined where the club is presently located.

Ken Rix and Gary Pierce assisted Bob with the survey work and established the location of the first launch ramp.

The winter of 1984 saw the lake freeze over in the cove to 11" in depth. Bob said this would be the perfect time to pour the launch ramp and establish our presence at the lake. So with considerable calculation and confidence and much hesitation by Ken and Gary, Bob designed and calculated how to build a form that could be constructed on the ice precisely where we wanted it to be under water. The 2x6 form was constructed on top of a 1 1/2" thick layer of Styrofoam. This engineering wonder was calculated by Bob to have the heat from the curing concrete melt the ice over


several days and when cured to a solid state the concrete would drop through the melted ice to the bottom of the lake establishing the 1 st boat ramp and the beginning of the Walnut Valley Sailing Club.

Also amazing was when Bob instructed the concrete truck driver to back out on the ice to pour concrete in the forms which were 70' long. I must say there were a few skeptics that day we began to create the Walnut Valley Sailing Club....

The second set of ramps that are now the dinghy docks were constructed on a bed of sand and after they cured, were pushed into place by the use of a very large caterpillar bulldozer. There were three sections built, attached together and one by one we're pushed into the lake. The sand allowed them to easily slide into the water. There was plans to build a jetty next to the dinghy ramp and have a hoist on it to accommodate the launching of large boats. This was never accomplished mainly because of the cost. Each section was 16' long. It was quite an effort to push all three sections into place.

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WVSC Board of Governors Meeting Minutes

January 12, 2023 7:00 pm

Sugar Shane's Café Augusta KS

1. Call to Order: 19:10 CST

BOG members: Commodore: Stuart Funk, Vice Commodore: Troy Oberly, Treasure: Preston Brammer, Secretary: Doug Albro, Rear Commodore: Chris Proudfoot, and Kevin Welch, Julie Barth, Ardie Condon, Paul Schye.

2. Commodore's Remarks:

The lake is very low; we are needing water at the lake, we have a concern for future operation of some of the bigger boats. There is also concern about sailing classes we intend to offer this summer. The floating dock for the small boats are pretty far from the shore right now. This distance could become an issue.

Commodore noted that the meeting venue (Sugar Shane's in Augusta) is acceptable for winter months if we can continue to use this back room. Its cost (\$50) is not conducive to being a year round location. [That said, several enjoyed the good food and beverages.]

3. Motion to Approve December BOG meeting minutes.

The chair called for a motion to approve the December 8th minutes of the BOG. Ardie Condon moved; James McEwen seconded. The Motion was approved.

4. Membership Concerns:

- Briefly noted the need for some rework to planks on the dock structure.
- There was a new person attending the Christmas party. Group noted that Andrew is Andrew. Is a member already. He has a Catalina 22. Ardie asked for additional information.

5. New Business:

- Board again discussed the Joe Goetz boat donation.
 - o BOG noted that we are not a 501c3. Also that we have a bill of sale, but not a title. (Kansas does not produce titles for boats, but does for trailers)
 - o Group noted that his boat should be added to the declared list of boats. (See attached documents which list current list of boat ownership by WVSC.
 - We "own" quite a few boats.
 - o There may be some sort of tax on the proceeds of a sale, if we don't show it helped with the "program".
 - o Group also noted that these will show up when Charlie and Preston do the "audit" of boats on the lake for the State Parks.
- Discussed that the STEP boats are possibly counted as non-taxable to us.
 - There is follow up to this discussion under "Sailing Activities".
- Alarm battery at the Club House.
 - Members noted that Club power was off at some time in the last week. Kevin advised that the "battery" fault being annunciated is the system back-up battery is located in the Women's Rest Room. (This is not the battery located in the keybpad unit in the main hall. It appears that the charger for the backup battery

has gone bad and needs attention.

- Kudo's !! Commodore Stuart is a Certified US Sailing level 1 instructor.
 - o There are many plans to share this with the club.
- More about sailing classes:
 - o People are contacting Stuart about an adult class.
 - o The Sonar is in good condition for this training. The group also noted that the Hunter 25 would probably be a more stable platform for beginners.
 - Also noted that it would be difficult to separate the funds resulting from a boat sail, for the Sailing Training activities. Also noted that there is an existing line item for Training.
 - o This will be discussed further as to which program will get the funds. There is a funding line item for training. The Hunter 25 is a more stable boat than a Sonar.
 - Jim McEwen moved authorize Stuart to do one of the two options (sell the boat, or decide to use it for training programs Paul Schye seconded. The Motion passed,
 - o Ardie wants to hear of any membership changes (deletes as well as adds)
 - The Johnsons are leaving, Goetz's, Hicks.
